Steeped in history our village sits at the bottom of Ham Hill which is one of the largest Iron Age hill forts in Europe. The honey coloured ham stone which gives the village its character has been quarried from the hill since the first settlements.

Standing high above the village on Ham Hill is the War Memorial, a distinctive feature which can be seen from near and far.

We have a thriving active community, two schools, two productive farms, three churches and many small businesses and shops.

We hope with this map to encourage you to explore this lovely area by showing you the footpaths marked in pale green and some circular walks marked with coloured footprints. For historical interest we have included some old field names, also shown are historic sites, conservation areas, beautiful views and friendly hostellers to keep you interested while walking.
